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## 2021 olive cotton award for photographic portraiture

The Olive Cotton Award for photographic portraiture is a \$20,000 biennial national award for excellence in photographic portraiture dedicated to the memory of photographer Olive Cotton. The winning work is acquired for the Gallery's collection. The exhibition is selected from entrants across Australia and is a significant opportunity for photographers living and working in Australia.

The Award was launched in 2005, and is funded by Olive Cotton's family and dedicated to her memory as one of Australia's leading twentieth century photographers. The Award has grown and gained national recognition attracting entries from established and emerging photographers across Australia. The Award boasts a major acquisitive biennial prize of \$20,000, selected by the Award Judge. In addition, the Friends of the Tweed Regional Gallery and Margaret Olley Art Centre Inc. fund \$4,000 for the acquisition of portraits chosen by the Gallery Director for the collection. Visitors to the exhibition may also vote for the 'People's Choice Award' of \$250 for the most popular portrait.

The Gallery thanks art dealer Josef Lebovic and photographer Sally McInerney, Olive Cotton's daughter, for their ongoing support of the Award. Thanks also to the Friends of the Gallery committee for their contributions, both financial and practical, to the Award and opening event.

#### 2021 Judge: Michael Cook

Michael Cook is considered to be one of Australia's most exciting contemporary photomedia artists. A Brisbane-based artist of Bidjara heritage, Cook's cinematic and psychologically-charged works critically examine current and historic attitudes towards First Nations peoples by restaging colonial-focused histories.

Having worked in commercial photography for over 30 years, Cook transitioned to fine art photography in 2009. His work has been exhibited widely throughout the world including the Museum of Photographic Arts, San Diego, the National Gallery of Victoria, the Musee d'ethnographie de Geneve, Switzerland, National Gallery of Singapore, AAMU Museum of Contemporary Aboriginal Art, The Netherlands, the Oceanographic Museum of Monaco, and The British Museum, London.

Cook's work is held in significant international collections including the British Museum, The Museum of World Cultures, Netherlands, Museum of Contemporary Aboriginal Art, Utrecht, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and the Kluge-Ruhe Aboriginal Art Collection, USA, as well as the National Gallery of Australia, Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art, National Gallery of Victoria, Art Gallery of New South Wales, Art Gallery of Western Australia and Tweed Regional Gallery.

# A connection beyond the image

Michael Cook

The Olive Cotton Award for photographic portraiture marks an aesthetic pause. Its occurrence every two years records, in the capture of individuals within the photograph, something of the recent experience of our place and time. When I look back at the last award in 2019 and before the global pandemic, it seems like a long time ago — a period during which we lost our innocence. But that is not the only factor that has shifted the world irrevocably. We are living in diverse times; apart from COVID-19 there is climate change, multiculturalism, the black lives matter movement, gender fluidity, an increasing interest in human rights, the treatment of women, and more. I believe that so many of these issues take us to our identity and the fundamental question of who we are as individuals, as a society. as humans.

These are global conversations that are unfolding powerfully in Australia — with our own characteristic flavour. Amid this groundswell, I believe that an artist can provoke conversations. True art has the ability to challenge the perceptions of its audience, and a photograph has this power.

The connection between the photographer and their subject extends well beyond the push of a shutter. A successful photograph finds the balance of idea, mood, feeling, lighting and positioning, all integral to developing questions in its audience. And in a photographic portrait an audience should find a connection. Often, and most successfully, this goes beyond the image to convey the subject's personality, giving the viewer another dimension to their experience. It might make us curious to know this person's story, to tease out the why as well as the who.

A portrait can tell so many stories with an expression or gesture, a hand over a face, or two hands meeting. A shadow, a certain object placed within the background may stimulate a thought process for the viewer and suggest how it might have been for that person in that moment. What I am looking for in a portrait is a combination that engages me in that mystery beyond the image; the unanswered questions that allow me to experience the portrait (the individual but also their milieu) in my own way.

An effective portrait may also touch the viewer on a deeper level, taking them into stories from their own history and life experiences, challenging their beliefs and extending understanding. In my view, it doesn't matter if a viewer has a different experience to the photographer, or understands its message in a completely different way. To me, there's nothing better than a viewer looking at one of my photographs and going on their own journey or tangent, somewhere altogether other. So often portraits may be understood to convey to us how a person looks. However, as recent debates have explored, identity is about so much more than appearance. Conceptual depth in a portrait allows us to extend and connect beyond superficial resemblance. As an artist, part of my drive to make work is in searching for my own identity, trying to connect with that as much as I can. We create a frame for our experiences and mine, as an Aboriginal man — is unusual.

When I left my earlier career as a commercial photographer to become an artist (more than ten years ago), I became aware that the way I work is different to other artists who also use photography, and also to other artists who make work about Indigenous issues. For me, the layering of history that is reflected in the layering of the image lets me tell a complex story - about Australia and the way in which First Nations peoples were disregarded (and worse), but also about the many layers in my own identity. People don't need to know the details of either of those narratives to enjoy the images I make, and I guess I am intrigued by art that works in a similar way — that takes us into an image that also allows us to choreograph our individual journey through it. That quality in a photographic portrait that allows us to engage but also encourages our own explorations is one I have pursued in the judging of this award. At the outset I noted that the Olive Cotton Award takes the temperature of our time. within what is a micro-snapshot of two years. I think that this year's award makes an even bigger leap than the one we have seen in previous prizes — it may reflect the really rapid change we have had to accommodate across the globe. The exponential growth that we've been through as individuals and artists since 2019 has been huge. I believe that this ability to reflect growth, stimulate the kinds of conversations we need to have to move forward positively, and to challenge an audience to move outside their own comfort zone is an essential ability that artists have. The selection of portraits in this year's award reflect the rapidity of our shift into unchartered waters, and offer us powerful pathways to think differently. The fact that they raise as many questions as they satisfy is to be celebrated.




















Olive Cotton (1911–2003) discovered the art of photography during childhood and was committed to the practice throughout her life. After gaining an Arts degree, she worked successfully as a photographer at Max Dupain's Sydney studio until the end of World War II. She was married to Dupain from 1937–1939 and then in 1944 married Ross McInerney and moved to the bush near Koorawatha, NSW.

For 20 years she had no access to darkroom facilities, but continued taking photographs. In 1964 Cotton opened a small studio in Cowra and in 1985, after a 40 year absence, re-emerged with her first solo exhibition at the Australian Centre for Photography in Sydney. She then concentrated on rediscovering and printing her life's work. In 2000 the Art Gallery of NSW showed *Olive Cotton*, a major retrospective of Cotton's work, curated by Helen Ennis, lecturer at the Australian National University, Canberra School of Art.

In 2016–17 Cotton was featured in the National Gallery of Australia's touring exhibition *Max & Olive: The Photographic life of Olive Cotton & Max Dupain* curated by Dr Shaune Lakin.
